Day 1: Day 1 - Conquering the game: the survival and strategy of recruiters (CEUs: 6)

Participants will gain an understanding of:

- The sub-culture of trafficking and “the game”
- The transitional process from victim to recruiter (for adult and youth victims)
- Different levels and types of victimization
- The psychological impact of being a “bottom”
- Unique trauma bonds between bottoms and their traffickers
- The impact of criminalization of bottoms
- Specific interventions with bottoms in group and residential settings
- How to assess and identify both the risks and benefits of including bottoms in treatment with other youth
- How to assess and minimize recruiting risks in group/residential settings



Tanya Gould-Street

A survivor of domestic sex trafficking, child pornography, sexual abuse as a minor, and controlling relationships, Tanya is the founder of Identifiable Me, a nonprofit whose purpose is to move those who have been victimized by sexual violence towards self-discovery and their life's purpose.

Years after being forced to drop out of college by her trafficker, she went back to college and earned her B.A.Sc. in Communications in 2015. Now, Tanya serves as a mentor, consultant, advisor, trainer, and speaker on topics relating to her story.

Tanya has featured over 20 interviews via television/articles, has trained/presented trafficking awareness presentations for over 150+ organizations and programs in a 6-year time span both nationally and internationally.

Day 2: Understanding Street Values & Exploitation (CEUs: 6)

Participants will gain an understanding of how to

- Identify strengths of utilizing dimension versus categorical strategies to understand recruitment
- Identify possible pathways to recruitment behavior
- Use interview strategies to understand hostile belief systems
- Intervene in hostile or aggressive behaviors

Dr. Hanlin is a licensed psychologist, certified in Trauma-Focused Cognitive Behavioral Therapy and is credentialed in working with sexually maladaptive and traumatized youth.

He received his Doctoral Degree in Psychology from Indiana State University and has over 25 years of clinical and administrative experience specific to sexual trauma and over a decade of experience working with survivors of human trafficking. He has provided consultation for the Indiana Department of Child Services, and the Marion County Task Force on Sexual Abuse. Dr. Hanlin currently serves as a psychologist for Ascent 121.
